- Walk visitors to where they need to go instead of giving complicated directions if they ask for help.
- Anticipate their needs: offer a wheelchair if they seem unsteady or offer directions to a restroom or the cafeteria if they mentioned they just arrived from a long drive.
- Ask them if there is anything they need that we may be able to assist with.
- Leave your phone in your pocket and pay attention to what is happening around you.
- We play an important part in the patient experience and it starts with being attentive and available to the needs of those around us.
